

Summer School 2022



Paulding County School District's 2021– 2022 summer school provides an opportunity for all currently enrolled Paulding County School District students in grades 8 – 12 to recover high school level credits attempted throughout the school year. Opportunities for new credit are available with prior approval. All courses are offered in an online format via PLATO software with our teachers/facilitators.

All grades for summer school will be available to the districted school once the summer school session has ended.

Registration:

- Registration must be approved and completed by the school counselor or NHEC staff.
- Tuition for recovery credit is free for students. Paulding County School District will support summer school costs for this summer only.
- Tuition for new credit is \$450 per 1 credit and \$225 per half (0.5) credit to be paid in the form of credit card, debit card, or personal check.
Payment for a new credit course is required at the time of registration.
Refunds are provided prior to June 7, 2022.
- All registration after June 3rd will occur at NHEC at the address below.

Location: Students may choose to attend in-person at New Hope Education Center. In-person attendance is optional but encouraged. Students who do not attend in person may work virtually. At the time of registration, students will be given further instructions for completing summer school virtually.

Thursday – work off site, teachers available via Zoom 8:00 a.m. – 12:00 p.m.
- **Virtual Learners** – Teachers available via Zoom Monday through Thursday 8:00 a.m. – 12:00 p.m.

EOC Testing: The weight of the EOC tests is 20%. EOC tests will be administered for students enrolled in American Literature, U.S. History, Algebra I, and Biology.






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FAQ:

1. How long is summer school?
 - June 2nd through June 27th
2. Can students take new credit?
 - Yes, but on a limited basis. Counselors must communicate with NHEC prior to registration.
3. What about NCAA eligibility for student athletes?
 - We can provide NCAA classes during the summer. Students in this situation must complete the entire course as a new credit and cannot end prior to the last day of summer school.
4. What about virtual status?
 - Students may choose to attend in-person at New Hope or work virtually from home. Students who work virtually have access to an instructor Monday through Thursday (8:00 a.m. to 12:00 p.m.) via Zoom video conferencing. In-person learners will attend New Hope Monday through Wednesday 8:00 a.m. to 11:00 a.m. and will work virtually each Thursday.
5. How many classes can a student take?
 - Students may register for either 0.5 or 1.0 credit. **If a student has completed a course by June 14, the student may register for a new class.** The additional course registration will occur at NHEC. If it is a new credit course, payment must be made at the time of registration.
6. What about End of Course (EOC) testing?

EOC Testing will take place June 28th, June 29th, and June 30th. The weight of the EOC tests is 20%. EOC tests will be administered for students enrolled in American Literature, U.S. History, Algebra I, and Biology.
7. When are the grades sent to the school?
 - Because NHEC is a PCSD program, grades are available to schools once summer school ends.
8. Are teachers available to help students?
 - Yes. We have certified teachers that are available to reteach and support students with their coursework in person or via Zoom video conferencing. All student work is done on computer.
9. Is there anything else that I need to know?
 - Summer school is a relatively brief but concentrated school semester. Due to the length of summer school, students should expect to spend 4-8 hours per day working on their courses regardless of being an in-person or virtual learner. Student courses are available to them 24 hours day, 7 days a week. We have had great success with our students successfully completing summer school each year. The student controls the pace of the coursework within the summer school time frame. Teachers are available in-person and via Zoom video conferencing to help students navigate successfully through summer school.



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
