How can you encourage students to use the school Wi-Fi?

- Airplane mode: putting a phone or tablet into airplane mode restricts the cellular data and cellular network. Students will not receive text messages, phone calls, or be able to access blocked websites while their phone is in airplane mode. It will also increase battery life.

Tips for Preparing a BYOT lesson

- Test your apps/websites on the student Wi-Fi
- Have a plan B prepared (at least in your mind)
- Determine what devices will work with your planned apps/websites: Find a buddy who is on iOS/Android and have them help you test
- Determine how many devices are needed- 1 per group, 1 per pair, 1 per student
