- 4 Units of English
- 4 Units of Mathematics

A total of 23 Units

NOTE: World Language (Foreign Language) is not required for graduation **<u>BUT</u>** is required for acceptance into a 4 year College or University.

What is MYAP?



- The Multi-Year Academic Planning tool (MYAP) is a process that helps students develop an academic path for their entire high school career.
- This tool is the method used for the student update his/her Individual Graduation Program (IGP).



MYAP Career Planner

- All high school students use the IC MYAP Career Planner
- The IGP (Individual Graduation Plan) is in the IC Student Portal
- This information includes completed, scheduled, and planned courses

The Multi-Year Academic Planner within Infinite Campus was developed to help students and parents create a 4-6 year academic plan which includes high school as well as the years beyond high school. This is a powerful tool that allows students to view and plan out courses for the four high school years to meet academic and career goals. The MYAP tool allows a student to create his/her IGP (Individual Graduation Plan) to:

- complete short and long-term academic planning to meet future career and employability goals
 map out the course work/curriculum over a period of years to meet graduation requirements
- plan and take advantage of the pathway courses for one of the IGP graduation program types

This plan is saved in IC and is updated throughout the student's high school career meeting each student's changing career and future goals. Thus, this tool allows a student with support from his/her school counselor to complete the student's academic plan throughout the entire high school career. In addition, 8th grade students transitioning to ninth grade also use this tool. Beginning in February 2017 this tool is utilized by students to complete Individual Graduation Plans also known as IGPs,

For the next school year, teachers make recommendations for core courses. Then, the student along with his/her counselor maps out the Individual Graduation Plan by selecting remaining courses for the next school year to total 8 courses. In addition, 8 courses per year for each subsequent school year(s) are updated on the four-year plan. School counselors assist with this process during classroom guidance. Thus, the student signs into the Academic Planner on Infinite Campus through the Portal and completes the IGP. Then, the parent reviews and approves the IGP after logging into the Parent Portal.

For a portion of second semester (end of current school year) as well as the beginning of the next school year, the plan can be reviewed, but not updated. Counselor's always know what the dates will be for the opening and closing of the IC portal to complete updates. In addition, counselors always have access to the Academic Plan and Academic Progress information.

IMPORTANT REMINDER: Current high schools students who have completed their YouScience assessment should review and use those results in preparing the Individual Graduation Plan (IGP).

Embedded Course

- Essentials of Healthcare, course number 25.44000.
- Essentials of Healthcare course now meets the fourth science requirement for high school graduation and meets the fourth science requirement for admission to the University System of Georgia and the Technical College System of Georgia.
- If one unit of credit is earned in Essentials of Healthcare, then, student will also receive one unit of credit for Human Anatomy and Physiology, course number 26.07300
- Both courses count for HOPE
- The EC Human Anatomy and Physiology course will be categorized as an <u>Elective</u> on the local high school transcript.

Pathway/Plan of Study

- High school students declare a pathway or Plan of Study beginning in 8th grade.
 - If a student is a CTAE pathway completer, the student takes 3 sequential courses in that pathway. A CTAE pathway completer also has the opportunity to take an End of Pathway Assessment
- A student is a pathway completer when he/she concentrates in the CTAE, Advanced Academic (English, Mathematics, Science, Social Studies), World Language and/or Fine Arts Pathway courses. Each student follows the GaDOE Plan of Study along with the BRIDGE Advisement Plan/Individual Graduation Plan

Declaration of Pathway/ Plan of Study

- Students declare one Pathway/Plan of Study in one of the following areas:
 - CTAE
 - Advanced Academic
 - World Language
 - Fine Arts

Advanced Academic

Advanced Academic Plan of Study/Pathway

Some students opt to take rigorous courses in the area of English, Mathematics, Science or Social Studies.

Students are strongly encouraged to select courses in one focused area of interest known as a Plan of Study and to build upon the career interest inventories that they have completed with counselors.

World Language

World Language-

Some students take a World Language course in the 9th grade. Two units in the same World (Foreign Language) is required to be admitted to a <u>four-year</u> college or university. A student may have a World Language Area of Focus in high school by completing 3 sequential World Language Courses

Again, students are strongly encouraged to select courses in one focused area of interest known as a Plan of Study and to build upon the career interest inventories that they have completed with counselors.



Fine Arts-Some students take either a visual or performing arts program as an elective course. Other students may want to complete a Fine Arts Pathway.

What if your student wanted to take a course Online during high school?

• SB289

- During the months of April Mid-July 2018, there will be a PCSD online registration opportunity for high school courses.
- Senate Bill 289 allows districts to provide students in grades 3 through 12 the option of taking an online course should you choose that option.
- Counselors have the online course information for high school courses. The district resource for new credit courses is called Canvas.

Credit Recovery Courses (Recommended by School Counselor)

- If there is a need to take a credit recovery course due to failing a course, the counselor can help determine if this option is a good choice.
- Credit recovery courses are taken via A+ or Georgia Virtual School. There is an approval process for taking these courses.

Why should students take Advanced Placement or Honors classes?

The U.S. Department of Education released a study that shows that by the time students enter college, the type of courses they took in high school is more important than test scores, class rank, or grade averages.

 The president of UGA says that rigor of curriculum is a factor above all others that determines success in the college admissions process.

What is the process for getting into Honors/AP classes?

- There is an Infinite Campus course request process during 2nd semester that utilizes the MYAP Tool.
 - The requested courses for next school year becomes the courses that are in the student's schedule.

How are Advanced Placement/Honors classes beneficial to the student's GPA?

Honors courses are <u>weighted</u>. With successful completion of the course, an average of 70 or above BEFORE weights are added, earns a student five (5) points onto the final course average.

For example: Student earns an 80 in Honors American Literature – the report card and transcript will reflect an 85 as the weighted points are added to the final average.

<u>Advanced Placement</u> courses add <u>10 points</u> to the final grade, if a 70 or above has been earned.)

AP and Honors Information Continued

- BRIDGE Graduation Plan, IGP or another document must have parent/guardian approval.
- Any mandatory spring meetings are announced and held for AP courses-typically meetings are held toward the end of the spring semester.

Elective Course Requests

Always get elective course information from the high school counselors.

Test-out Opportunities for Credit

Students may request to test out in any of the EOC courses. The student cannot be taking the EOC course at the time of testing.
Test-out Opportunities Basic Requirements and Information

- 1. The law currently states the limit is 3 courses during high school.
- 2. PCSD Test-out Registration Opportunity is communicated by the Director of Student Assessment. Test-out Registration is an online registration opportunity on the district website.
- 3. Student cannot have started a course(s) that he/she is planning to test-out.
- 4. A payment of \$50.00 must be made for each test. Students who score Distinguished will have this money reimbursed after scores come back.
- 5. Prior to the test-out opportunity a grade of B or higher will be validated. Also, a teacher recommendation regarding the test-out opportunity must be received. This recommendation is completed by the student's teacher in the subject area.

EOC assessments are taken during the time frames announced by the Director of Student Assessment.

Promotion

Students are in these cohorts during high school Cohort Year 1 = Grade 9

Cohort Year 2 = Grade 10

Cohort Year 3 = Grade 11

Cohort Year 4 = Grade 12

- Students must have a minimum of the following number of credits to be promoted:
 - From 9th to 10th grade-5 credits
 - From 10th to 11th grade-11 credits
 - From 11th to 12th grade-17 credits

HOPE Scholarship Rigorous List

Students must continually review that a minimum of <u>4 rigorous</u> courses from the <u>10-page document</u> on the GAfutures website below are completed in order to be eligible for the HOPE Scholarship. HOPE GPA

- Please remember that a HOPE GPA is calculated on a 4.0 scale and the focus is on <u>academic courses</u> <u>completed</u>. <u>No middle school course are counted for</u> <u>the HOPE GPA</u>.
- Some science courses that are used in a CTAE pathway also count as the 4th Science requirement. All of these courses automatically calculate into the HOPE GPA.
- Non-academic elective courses do not count.
- Thus, a numeric GPA of 83.4%, does not necessarily mean that the HOPE GPA will be 3.0 or higher.
- Please monitor HOPE GPA via GAfutures account.

Dual Enrollment Defined

A process by which high school students take courses from a state public or private postsecondary institution while still enrolled as a high school student and receive credit both at the high school and at the postsecondary institution.

Terms = Fall, Spring, and Summer

2015 Legislation

SB 132 – Dual Enrollment Program

- High school students may enroll while in 9th 12th grades
- Earn dual credit
- Wide range of courses

<u>SB 2 – New High School Graduation Option</u> • Students complete at least the following state required high school courses or their equivalent:

- 1 required health and PE course
- 2 English
- 2 math
- 2 science
- 2 social studies
- Complete an associate degree, technical diploma or two technical certificate programs in a career pathway and all training prerequisites for any state, national, or industry occupational certifications or licenses required to work in the field

Awarded a high school diploma and a college credential(s)

Dual Enrollment Eligibility

- Enrolled in our district
- No residency requirement
- Meet admissions requirements and deadlines at participating postsecondary institution
- Admitted as a Dual Credit Enrollment student at a participating postsecondary institution
- May attend more than one postsecondary institution at a time and receive awards at both
- Must be enrolled in courses listed in the approval Dual Enrollment Directory (GAfutures site)
- Maintain postsecondary satisfactory academic progress

Financial Considerations

- \succ Tuition is paid.
- Mandatory fee costs are covered.
- Books are provided.
- The Eligible Postsecondary Institution can charge the student Course Related Fees or Supplies or require the student to have the required course related items.
- Expenses for travel or living on campus are provided by the student.

- 3. Take the SAT, ACT, or Accuplacer. Different programs require different tests for admissions. You must take the test and have the scores sent to the desired institution. Test results must be received by the college by the application deadline.

- 4. Apply to your school of choice. Once you know where you want to go, apply through that school's website.
 - a. There may be an application fee.
 - b. Sometimes a counselor advisement conference and/or signature is required as part of the application process. Thus, please schedule an appointment with your high school counselor to complete necessary paperwork. Please do not wait until the day before the deadline as you may not be able to see your counselor that quickly.
- 5. Once you have completed admissions requirements and are accepted by your chosen institution, you must meet with your counselor to fill out necessary paperwork and to discuss courses for your upcoming senseter at college. DE Form is a required district document. Be thinking about how many classes you would like to take at the high school and how many you would like to take at the college. If you want to be a full time college student you must take at least four (4) three-hour college courses and a minimum of 12 college hours. Anything less, you will have to fill your remaining schedule with high school or take online courses through the Paulding Virtual Academy program. Your counselor will work with you on scheduling classes to meet your graduation requirements as well as determine the college courses to build your college transcript.
- 6. Deadlines: Please make sure you are aware of the college admission deadline as well as your high school deadline. Most often college admission deadlines come <u>before</u> the district deadlines, but you must schedule an appointment with your counselor to review acceptance documents and procedures before the district high school deadline. If you do not, the counselor may not be able to complete your necessary paperwork in time. School district deadlines for the 2017-2018 school year are:
 - a. Fall Semester: High School Deadline July 21, 2017
 - b. Spring Semester: High School Deadline December 8, 2017
 - c. Summer Term: High School Deadline April 27, 2018
- 7. A few more things to know
 - a. You are responsible for all high school information (i.e. testing dates, class activities, etc.). Check school website often.
 - b. Know your GAfutures login information. Your GAfutures account must have a working email, (link for help with GAfutures account: <u>http://www.paulding.ktb.ga.us/Page/32638</u>), and the GAfutures online application process is required.

Advisement Topics

During the advisement sessions with students and parents, counselors address the following topics with student and parent/guardian:

- Maturity level of the student
- Post-secondary plans of the student
- Individual career goals and IGP (Individual Graduation Plan)
- Necessary <u>tests for admission</u> to the postsecondary institution(s) of choice

Application and acceptance by the post-secondary institution

Dual Enrollment and HOPE and Zell Miller Scholarship

- Core courses are included in the student's HOPE high school GPA for HOPE Scholarship and Zell Miller Scholarship eligibility determinations.
- Core coursework taken as dual enrollment meets Academic Rigor requirements and are given a weight of 0.5 toward HOPE Calculation. The HOPE GPA calculation has a cap of 4.0.
- College transcript begins as Dual Enrollment student.
- Dual Enrollment hours do not count against any HOPE hour cap.
