Reading

As we read The Wizard of Oz, we will not only be focusing on story elements, but we will be working on really describing each. Included in this will be characters, setting, and important events.

We will be doing a great deal of writing as we read <u>The</u>
Wizard of Oz.

R2: Identifies key details; retells stories

R3: describes story elements using key details

Math

We continue to add more and more names to our 120 board! This is fabulous, and those that are not there yet are SO CLOSE! Please remember that your child must also be able to orally count these numbers as well.

The number line and tally marks have been used in proving our addition problems. We will be using the number line for subtraction as well. Our students need to understand that there is a relationship between addition and subtraction. They must also understand that the equal sign acts like the pivot point on a scale. Each number or equation equals the same amount on each side.

NBT1: extends the counting sequence. Counts, reads, writes, and represents numbers up to 120.

OA5: Relate counting to addition and subtraction

School - to -Home Connection

Math: Help us develop the meaning of the equal sign! Using small objects, create an addition or subtraction problem. Maybe using sea shell pasta and a piece of paper, put 4 in a group and then another 4 in a group. Write an addition sign in between them. Then write in an = sign after the second group of shells. Put either 8 shells or a wrong number shells and see if your child can tell you why it's right or wrong. To accelerate, use two more groups of shells on the right side of the = sign and create another problem. See if your child can tell if the two equations are equal.

Reading: Can your child tell you the story elements of a story? What about the difference between a main character and a secondary character?

Phonics: See if your child can name as many CVC words as possible. CVC words are words that have 2 consonants surrounding a vowel. This makes the vowel sound short. Some examples are dog, hat, and kid.
