Mission Possible: Graduation and Beyond & BRIDGE Advisement

- Counselors support all students in three life areas:

 - Careers

 - BRIDGE Advisement supports students in making career decisions during and beyond high school
 - BRIDGE Advisement activities are mandated by state law (signed into law May 2010).

REFLECTING ON BRIDGE ADVISEMENT

- After the Reality/Pathway Fair high school counselors provided classroom guidance to students.
- An informational night was held by middle school counselors for parents and students.
- A face-to-face (f2f) BRIDGE advisement opportunity was facilitated by middle school counselors to complete the BRIDGE Advisement Graduation Plan.
- Students updated their Individual Graduation Plans in Infinite Campus. The new tool used is MYAP (Multi-Year Academic Planner). document.
- Students entered planned courses for the 9th, 10th, 11th and 12th grade years.
- Students 9th grade planned courses become course requests for next school year. Students also entered 3 alternate courses in ninth grade.

BLOCK Courses

- A student can earn 4 credits 1st semester and 4 more during the 2nd semester and graduate with 32 credits!
- Advantages:
 - □ Students will have an opportunity to complete more than one pathway.
 - ☐ If a student fails a course, there more options to get caught up.
 - □ A student can actually take advantage of the Dual Enrollment program and earn college credits at least by Junior or Senior year.

What is a High School Diploma?

Facts continued

What is a high school transcript?

An official record of academic status which includes state course numbers and course titles plus grades earned. Credits are also on the transcript. For each course in which a 70 or higher was earned either a .5 or 1.0 credit is recorded. For a course in which a 69 or lower grade was earned 0 credit is recorded.

What is a Grade Point Average?

The total calculation of all grades received during high school is referred to as the GPA, for example, Numerical (i.e. 92.5) Currently, high school transcripts have a numerical grade point average and 4.0 GPA calculation. Class rank is based on the numerical GPA.

Facts continued

What about the HOPE Scholarship?

Please know that a HOPE GPA is calculated on a 4.0 scale. The PCSD transcript includes a 4.0 GPA scale but calculates <u>all</u> courses taken for high school credit.

- Only academic courses (core and elective) count for HOPE
- No high school courses taken during middle school count for HOPE
- Non-academic elective courses do not count
- Thus, an overall numeric GPA of 83.4% (numeric GPA also included on high school transcript), does not necessarily mean that the HOPE GPA will be a 3.0 or higher.
- HOPE grade point information is transmitted on a 4.0 GPA scale to the Georgia Student Finance Commission and is not a numerical GPA.

Weighted—Per local board policy extra points are added for honors and Advanced Placement courses as well as Dual Enrollment core courses.

For HOPE-AP courses are weighted for the purposes of calculating HOPE Scholarship eligibility with AP courses not weighted beyond a 4.0 GPA for HOPE.

Core Dual Enrollment courses are weighted in the HOPE scholarship calculation, but are also not weighted beyond a 4.0 GPA for HOPE.

HOPE Scholarship (4 Rigorous Courses Required)

- ► Currently, the HOPE scholarship is determined by the calculation of <u>all</u> academic core courses that the student has taken and completed (grades 9-12). <u>No middle school core course grades count.</u>

- ▶ Both passing and failing grades in the core courses count. Thus, this is a merit based scholarship for eligible students.
- ► Changes in the eligibility guidelines are posted and updated on the GAfutures website (there are often annual changes in HOPE Scholarship regulations). For current HOPE tuition payments use this link:

KEEP HOPE ALIVE!

 Both passing and failing grades are recorded on the high school transcript and the HOPE eligible transcript. The student information system (Infinite Campus) must have the correct legal name, social security number and birth date for a student to be HOPE eligible.

Transcript is sent electronically from the Paulding County School District to Georgia Student Finance Commission via GAfutures.org. Then, GSFC determines eligibility.



After the 1st semester of 9th grade, students may view their HOPE transcript via their MyGAfutures account at: Gafutures.org

Students will have an updated HOPE GPA within 30 days of the close of each semester during high school on their My GAfutures account.

Course grades earned in middle school are not calculated in the HOPE grade point average.

More Facts

What is the High School Grading Period?

Credit is awarded at the close of each semester with a full credit/1.0 credit. There are very few .5 credit courses. An example of a nine-weeks .5 credit course is Health.

• What is the Grading Scale?

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90-100 = A
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$$80-89 = B$$

$$70-79 = C$$

$$00-69 = F$$

Athletic Eligibility, Okay to Play

- An entering ninth grade student is eligible to participate in athletic activities for the first semester;
- To be eligible after the first semester, a student must "earn 2.5 credits each semester and be on track to graduate".
- At the end of the ninth grade year, the student must be on track (5 credits earned).

TESTING

- ✓ EOC (End-of-Course) Assessments
 - ✓ Counts 20% of the final grade for the course
 - ✓ Course must be passed.
 - ✓ Areas Tested in Either 8th or 9th Grade:

Ninth Literature/Composition

GSE Algebra I

GSE Geometry

Biology

These tests are taken in 10th, 11th or 12th grades toward the end of the course:

Test-Out Options for EOC Courses Only

Information provided already during previous advisement opportunities included:

- 1. Student is limited to 3 credits earned during high school.
- 2. PCSD Test-out Registration Opportunity was during January with information available prior to this registration opportunity. At this time \$50.00 must be paid for each test that student is going to take. Important: Student who scores *Distinguished* on any test taken has money reimbursed.
- 3. A reminder that any student cannot have started a course(s) that he/she is planning to test-out.
- 4. During February a grade of B or higher was validated in the subject area in which the test was taken by the student's teacher. Also, during February a teacher recommendation regarding the test-out opportunity was received.
- 5. EOC assessments are taken during March for all interested students, including current high school students.
- 6. When the district has the results and the *Distinguished* score is available, student will have transcript updated with course number, course title and the credit earned by his/her school counselor.
- 7. There will be an annual reminder that this opportunity is available.

What if a student wants take a course Online during high school?

- ✓ A reminder that from April 1 through mid-July 2018, there will be a PCSD online registration opportunity for Online high school courses.
- ✓ Senate Bill 289 allows districts to provide students in grades 3 through 12 the option of taking an online course should you choose that option.



More Online Course Information

- Counselors have the online course information for high school courses and offer an advisement opportunity regarding online courses each semester.
- Counselors assist students with any online questions.



What is the Paulding Virtual Academy?



- The Paulding Virtual Academy will offer students the opportunity to use teacher supported, technology-based courses to earn new high school credit, recover credit, continue coursework or accelerate their progression through high school and into college level courses.
- The application process for Fall semester begins April 1.


