The Paulding County School District Safe Schools App can be used to report suicidal ideation and bullying. Students can use the app to help keep their classmates safe by reporting unsafe text messages, social media posts and other electronic communication. The Safe Schools App is easy to use and reports can be made anonymously. Every report goes to the district office and also to the local school.
