McClure Middle School Principal Jaynath Hayes says she wasn't completely surprised to learn that state Superintendent Richard Woods had appointed not one, but two of her students to his 2018-2019 Superintendent's Advisory Council.

According to the state Department of Education, Grace and Preston are two of more than 120 students selected from schools throughout Georgia. Throughout the school year, these middle and high school students will meet with Superintendent Woods to discuss the impact of state policies in the classroom. Members of the Student Advisory Council will also discuss other issues related to education, serve as the Superintendent's ambassadors to their respective schools, and participate in service projects to benefit schools and students.

They were selected from a pool of nearly 1,000 applicants who applied to serve on the council. Students were chosen based on the strength of their essay answers, which focused on their ideas for public education as well as their community service experience.

According to Melissa Barber, who is the English Language Arts Department Chair and teaches 9th grade-level Honors Literature at McClure, both students are outstanding choices to represent McClure and Paulding County on the advisory council.

"Preston is a hard-working and conscientious student. When we work in collaborative groups, he often takes a leadership role in helping his group get started and stay focused," said Ms. Barber. "He is always ready and eager to help out a student who may be struggling, and he does so in a kind and constructive manner. He is well-versed in what it takes to be a successful 8th grade student and would be an excellent choice to work in an advisory role."

She had similarly kind words to say about Grace.

"Gracie is a diligent and dedicated student. She is always well-organized and works hard in her classes," said Ms. Barber.
